- To begin to find ways of linking our literary goals with goals of civic engagement



## Yesteryear at the BAC: Cooking as Literature

The International Association of Culinary
Professionals (IACP) awards the Julia Child First
Book Award each year "...to the first cookbook by a
writer who has not previously authored or coauthored a
food or beverage related book." This is only one of
fifteen categories of cookbooks that the IACP
recognizes each year. Cookbooks eligible for the Julia
Child award must contain recipes and the category "...
requires recipe testing/evaluation by the judges."

I don't know if cookbooks are eligible for the Boston Author Club's Julia Ward Howe Award. A cookbook might be considered a reference book in which case it wouldn't be. On the other hand, one of the IACP categories is "Literary or Historical Food Writing" which, we are assured, does not require recipe testing by the judges. So maybe we'll see a BAC cookbook someday, presumably in the Non-Fiction category.




Haydn S. Pearson was a cookbook author who joined the Boston Authors Club in 1948. According to Notable Boston Authors, Pearson was known as "Mr. New England" presumably because he wrote the Country Correspondence column for the New England States edition of the Boston Herald.

Pearson's most famous cookbook is the *Country Flavors Cookbook* first published by himself in 1954 with a second edition published by Norton in 1962. The book contains recipes which, I imagine, would appeal to New Englanders but I'd be hard pressed to come up with a characterization of this collection even after reading over the recipes. Maybe that's just because my childhood midwestern favorites such as city chicken and creamed succotash aren't among them. One does find Uncle Thaddeus' Tomato-Rice Casserole, Dora's Sausage Flavored Cinnamon Sponge Cake, and Blanche's Bran-Prune Muffins. (No bran-prune muffin ever made it west of the Appalachians.)

In addition to the 115 recipes, all of which are spiced with Pearson's comments (Mrs. Jacob's Date Swirls includes some facts about palm trees taken from the 1949 Yearbook of Agriculture), there are 70 of what Pearson calls "Country Flavor Essays". These are one-page downhome remembrances which I'd wager are reprints of Pearson's Herald column and they are delightful reading. Penny candies, box suppers, and seed catalogs are just a few of the subjects covered.

The deadline for submitting books for the 2020 Julia Ward Howe Prize is January 31, 2020. If you wrote a cookbook in 2019 and live within 100 miles of Boston, why not go ahead and enter it in the contest? I can't promise it will be declared eligible but I will promise to try one of the recipes. Just not the bran-prune muffins.


Tobin is an honored BAC author and the Julia Ward Howe prize winner for his 2016 book **From Nothing.**


